

Folklore and Public Culture (MA/MS)

The master of arts (MA) or master of science (MS) degree in folklore and public culture is interdisciplinary. In consultation with an advising committee, students take designated courses from faculty members in anthropology, arts and administration, English, folklore and public culture, German, Scandinavian, and music in addition to elective courses that strengthen their areas of expertise. A public folklore track is available to students preparing for careers in the public sector. A thesis or terminal project is required for completion of the degree. Students working toward an MA degree must demonstrate competence in a second language.

Students in the masters degree program in Folklore and Public Culture may choose from two tracks with differing emphases. The General Folklore Track provides students with a strong foundation in folklore studies while also allowing students to take elective courses in their areas of focus. The General Folklore Track requires students to take specific classes from Folklore and Public Culture program faculty in a variety of subjects including anthropology, arts and administration, English, and music, among other disciplines. The Public Folklore Track prepares students who plan to work in the public sphere by building professional skills such as ethnographic research, documentation, grant writing, administration and programming. The program also focuses on building scholarly fundamentals of folklore and establishing relationships within the folklore field.

Program Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this program, students will be able to:

- Identify and explain key concepts in folklore studies.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the research methods associated with folklore studies.
- Understand and apply fieldwork methods and proper documentation techniques necessary for submission of fieldwork for archival preservation.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the multiple theoretical orientations contributing to an understanding and analysis of folkloric expression.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the types of folkloric expression and various types of folk groups in relationship to historical, cultural, and social contexts.
- Understand and give examples of what academic and public folklorists do.
- Understand ethical issues and responsibilities relating to fieldwork, professionalism, and the writing and publishing of scholarly papers.
- Conduct independent research and analysis, culminating in a thesis or a terminal project based on original research, presented within a scholarly framework, that makes a substantive contribution to current knowledge in the field.

Language Requirement for the MA Degree

The master of arts degree requires the satisfactory completion of a
second-year level of proficiency in a second language, as required
for the B.A. degree (see Bachelor's Degree Requirements ([https://
catalog.uoregon.edu/admissiontograduation/bachelorrequirements/](https://catalog.uoregon.edu/admissiontograduation/bachelorrequirements/)) in
the catalog for details). Competency may be demonstrated by either
a standardized test or with adequate undergraduate course work.
Language competence must be demonstrated within the overall seven-
year limit for completion of a master's degree.
