

Forensic Anthropology Minor

Forensic Anthropology is the study of human remains for medicolegal purposes, relying on facets of human anatomy, skeletal biology, human behavior, taphonomy, and pathology. Forensics applies these sciences to the legal process. This minor in Forensics Anthropology is intended to complement a major in another discipline.

Forensic Anthropology Minor Requirements

16 of the 24 credits used to fulfill the minor requirements must be taken for a letter grade and passed with a grade of C- or better.

No more than 4 credits can be used to fulfill the minor requirements if taken and passed with a grade of D-, D, or D+.

No more than 4 credits can be used to fulfill the minor requirements if taken and passed with a grade of Pass.
