

Historic Preservation Minor

Historic preservation explores, protects, interprets, and manages change in the existing physical and cultural environment. It is an inherently interdisciplinary field. The minor is particularly well-suited for students studying anthropology, architecture, history, the history of art and architecture, landscape architecture, and planning, public policy and management. Undergraduate students, no matter their major, are eligible to enroll in the minor.

Historic Preservation Minor Requirements

Courses used to fulfill the minor requirements must be taken for a letter grade and passed with a grade of C- or better. Some courses required for the minor are only offered every other year.
